How will you expand the Fair Pass?

Why we ask: Even with the Fair Pass program, transit can cost a large amount of monthly income, making it harder to afford basic needs.

How will you address mobility poverty?

Why we ask: Longer travel times and unreliable transit can limit health care access in high-need communities.

How will you improve transit accessibility?

Why we ask: The lengthy application process and required healthcare documentation can create unnecessary barriers



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How will you improve access to health care for Low-income families?

Why we ask: Health care costs such as prescription drugs can be expensive and inaccessible.

How will you ensure seniors and those on fixed incomes get the care they need?

Why we ask: Seniors with low incomes can face barriers to accessing health care.

What strategies will you use to address racial health inequities?

Why we ask: Racialized populations can face disparities in health care treatment.

Do you support closing the rent-control loopholes — and how will you pressure the province to do so?

Why we ask: There is a demand for affordable housing supports.

How will you make sure new housing includes homes that families, seniors, and middle-income workers can afford — not just luxury condos?

Why we ask: Everyone deserves access to safe and affordable housing

What targets will you commit to reducing evictions and rent increases over the next four years?

Why we ask: There needs to be clear, measurable and effective targets

Will you commit to fully funding the Universal Student Food Program so every child in our community has access to a healthy lunch by 2030?

Why we ask: All children and youth deserve access to affordable and nutritious food.

Do you believe food banks are a permanent solution, or will you vote to increase city grants for food programs?

Why we ask: Many people with developmental disabilities live on fixed incomes that don't cover the rising cost of groceries.

How will you use the City's powers to create affordable food solutions that are physically and financially accessible to everyone?

Why we ask: Community agencies need more grants to move toward long-term food solutions.
